Welcome to the June edition of the school newsletter. We hope and trust you had a very enjoyable Spring Bank Holiday week.



A photo-collage hopefully catching the spectacle of the event is below.






Governor Vacancies

Key Stage 1 & 2 Tests



The Year 2 & 6 children were a credit to their families as they sat their tests with maturity and enthusiasm. The testing weeks were very tiring for them. The Year 2 test results will be reported but are internally marked and form part of the information on your child's achievement that informs the end of year teacher assessment level. The Year 6 tests have been sent off to external markers and we will not find out the results until well into July. We are very proud of all our pupils and are confident these cohorts will do well as internal tracking systems

As well as thanks to the children, the staff of the school deserve praise as their input and inspiration over this year and indeed over recent years, it has been truly amazing. Year 4 Times Table Test

Tests on times tables for all Year 4 children will become statutory from 2020.

The school has volunteered to pilot these tests with the current Year 4 children from next Monday. The test is a short online test where the children have 6 seconds to answer a question. The children will unfortunately not be informed on how well they have done until July. We hope to include the information on your child's report.



Software to help and encourage all children to learn their times tables is 'Times Table Rockstars'. Children from Year 1 upwards have their own 'Rock Avatar' and can earn points for their avatar and to work towards a series of certificates and badges that are awarded in assembly. We are delighted to let you know that the school have now subscribed to an app (available from the 'App Store' - Apple or the Play Store -Android). This can be installed on phones/tablets etc and the children then just need to log in with their normal school user name and password. We hope good use is made of it. Further information is on the page after the phonics details.

Phonics Phases

There is a very useful booklet entitled 'Letters and Sounds – Phonics Information for Parents and Carers' which can be downloaded from our web site. Simply visit the 'Parenting Information and Guidance Zone' and click on 'Phonics Information for Parents'. With the increased emphasis on phonics teaching from

the Government as the vehicle to ensure children are reading by the end of Year It is well worth re-reading this booklet.

The purpose of these next two pages is to summarise parts of that booklet and enable you to check your child's phonetic knowledge at home and support them in their phonics learning. Children in Year 1 and those in Year 2 who didn't pass last year will be tested with 'real words' and 'nonsense' words. A sample of the test which you may wish to try on your children is in the revision zone on the web site (use the name 'bps' and password 'home'). The check will be in the form of flashcards...the plain ones are 'real' words and the ones with alien pictures

are the 'nonsense' words that have to be pronounced phonetically correct.

The teaching structure for phonics runs over 6 phases...these are summarised below with approximate timings and age expectations. Please note that a 'phoneme' is the sound of the letters and a 'grapheme' is what they look like written down.

On the following page are assessment sheets that can be used to support your child. They are assessed at school and work is targeted to help them develop their phonetic knowledge. This work may be ongoing well into the upper end of Key Stage 2 for some children so don't worry too much if your child is not at the stage you think they should be yet as children develop their reading at different speeds.

We have added some resources to help you support your child at home to the 'Parenting Information and

Guidance Zone' including some posters and a



link to Mr Thorne's phonics site – this is excellent and you and your child can watch videos for the appropriate phase (use the menus on the black bar across the page) and watch Mr Thorne pronounce them correctly

With all the increased focus on phonics and at such a fast pace it is important to also understand that children will only read when they are ready and that their phonics alone will not produce fluent readers. There are many other strategies to help children read that we deploy in school and that you can do at home such as sharing reading every day. It is of utmost importance children do not feel pressurised or stressed if they cannot grasp these aspects of reading straight away to become a lifelong reader who great enjoyment gains reading then reading needs to be seen as a pleasure not a chore.

Phase One (Nursery/Reception) & ongoing Age expectation: 3-4 years	Activities are divided into seven aspects, including listening to environmental sounds, instrumental sounds, body sounds, rhythm and rhymes (lots of nursery rhyme practice!!), alliteration (sentences with words beginning with the same letter), voice sounds and finally saying the sounds and putting them together	
Phase Two (Reception) up to 6 weeks Age expectation: 4-5 years	Learning 19 letters of the alphabet and one sound for each. Blending sounds together to make words. Separating words into their separate sounds. Beginning to read simple captions.	
Phase Three (Reception) up to 12 weeks Age expectation: 5 years	The remaining 7 letters of the alphabet, one sound for each. Graphemes such as ch, oo, th representing the remaining phonemes not covered by single letters. Reading captions, sentences and questions. On completion of this phase, children will have learnt the "simple code", i.e. one grapheme for each phoneme in the English language.	
Phase Four (Reception) 4 to 6 weeks	No new grapheme-phoneme correspondences are taught i this phase. Children learn to blend and segment longer words with adjacent consonants, e.g. swim, clap, jumg.	
Age expectation: 5-6 years		
Phase Five (Throughout Year 1) Age expectation: 6-7 years	Now we move on to the "complex code". Children learn more graphemes for the phonemes which they already know, plus different ways of pronouncing the graphemes they already know.	
Phase Six (Throughout Year 2 and beyond)	Working on spelling, including prefixes and suffixes, doubling and dropping letters etc.


Goal



When it comes to times tables, speed AND accuracy are important – the more facts your child remembers, the easier it is for them to do harder calculations.

Times Table Rock Stars is a fun and challenging programme designed to help students master the times tables!

To be a Times Table Rock Star you need to answer any multiplication fact up to 12×12 in less than 3 seconds!







Game Modes

Single Player 🏄

Garage - the questions will only come from the times tables the teacher has set for the week. It will include multiplication *and* division questions.

As pupils start to answer questions, TT Rock Stars works out which facts they take longer on and will give them more of these questions to answer. The Garage is best for getting quicker at a few facts. Players get 10 coins per question.

Studio - the questions in the Studio can be anything from 1×1 up to 12×12.

TT Rock Stars calculates the mean response time from their last 10 games in the Studio and translates that time into a Rock Status.

If you don't play in the Studio you don't get a Rock Status.

Players earn 1 coin per question and the Studio is the place for them to set their best time across all the tables.

Soundcheck – When you play Soundcheck, you get 20 questions each with a 5-second time limit. The questions are multiplication only and evenly weighted in terms of difficulty each time you play. Players earn 5 coins per correct answer.

Multiplayer 🎉

Rock Arena - The Arena allows players to compete against all other members of their Band (their Bandmates would need to join the same game in order to compete together). A new Arena game starts every 15 seconds and once the clock starts they race to answer more questions than the others. In the Arena, questions will only come from the times tables the teacher has set for the week, similar to the Garage. They earn 1 coin per correct answer.

Rock Festival - The Rock Festival games are open to players from around the world. Like the Arena, there is no limit to the number of players who can join a game; however, unlike the Arena, questions are selected at random from 1×1 to 12×12.

Pupils might choose the Rock Festival if they were playing at home (and therefore couldn't easily synchronise playing against a classmate) or wanted to compete against others not in their Band. They earn 1 coin per correct answer.



SUMMER BINGO NIGHTS



These take place on Tuesday 18th June and Wednesday 19th June. To even up

numbers (100 max per night) the first date is nominally for families with children in the Foundation Stage or Key



Stage 1 and the latter for families in Key Stage 2. You can of course attend the one that suits you best or indeed both!!

Tickets for these events are available from the School Office. All tickets cost £3.50 which includes a Bingo book, a hot dog and a drink. Tickets MUST be shown on the night to receive your Bingo book (additional books will be on sale at the door priced at £1).

Ice cream/Iollies (50p) and stand up Bingo tickets (£1) will also be on sale at the interval.

The Easter week Bingo Nights proved to be extremely popular raising a lot of money to help FAB/PTA

Sharing information is in the best interests of children and their safeguarding. The school reserves the right to share and receive information from other agencies that may had have had dealings with your child.



If you ever have any concerns about the safety or well-being of a child, then you can ring your concerns through to the County's 24 hour 'Safeguarding Hub' number and you can remain anonymous if you wish. Callers can outline their concerns and the Safeguarding Hub will give advice (consultation) and if necessary undertake an assessment of need.



There is now also an adult NSPCC helpline where any concerned adult can seek advice if they are concerned about a child and would like advice on whether to make a referral. The number to call is



Compliance with the PE Kit policy will be reported on your child's end of year report and letters/texts will go home if there are issues.






Breakfast Club Sandwiches


On the last Friday of each month the Breakfast Club serve bacon or sausage sandwiches at a cost of 50p per child or
