



The school receives a contribution towards free books for the classrooms with every book purchased so please do try and shop for books with us!

You will receive a letter regarding Parents' evenings and appointment times in the very near future; the appointments are for you and your child (one appointment per child unless there are specific reasons for 2 appointments) to attend to discuss progress to date and success or otherwise in meeting the targets that were set at the autumn meeting. Please note that brothers and/or sisters should not be at these meetings but should be in the crèche. The meeting will focus on a detailed report of your child's progress. In addition you will also receive their coloured ratings for effort, behaviour, attendance and many other things as per the last meeting. We will also be asking you to support your children by setting further targets for you to support them at home and these will be reviewed at the end of the year.

The Parents' meetings will take place on Monday 25th or Tuesday 26th March. Please note these dates in your diary.



Nursery appointments are children moving into Reception only.

Monday 25th March – Nursery Green & Yellow Tuesday 26th March – Nursery Blue & Red

Some of your child's school work will be in the Sports Hall (KS1 & Reception) or the Dining Hall (KS2) for you to look through. We will also be asking you to complete a questionnaire (further details later in the newsletter). In addition to the above there is also a free crèche if you have more than one child so you can spend the quality time with each child separately (the crèche however is not equipped to look after pre-school children). It is essential you attend as all educational evidence shows that when school and home work closely together a child makes better progress.

World Book Day

voucher TODAY. The token is worth £1 off a book in a book store; it will allow your child to buy this World Book Day's book or will give £1 discount at the School Book Fair which will be open for sales at the school from this Friday.



School Milk

Hello all and welcome to March! I hope you have all been enjoying the sun!

This month brings us World Book Day, which is not only an opportunity for our children to dress up as their favourite character for the day and enjoy a Roald Dahl themed lunch, but the Book Fair also comes along with it (plus a voucher towards a new book!). We will be encouraging everyone to bring in some of their favourite reading material to read for pleasure during the day. It's a very exciting day for us all and really highlights the enjoyment that we can get from books. Reading can provide children with hours of entertainment, free their imagination and open up exciting new worlds. Reading is vital to success in school and at work, expanding vocabulary and helping build independence and confidence. It can also help keep our children safe, allowing them to read and understand warning signs and labels. The children are given varied opportunities to read and be read to at school, both with staff and their peers, but I encourage you all to spend time reading with your children at home and encouraging them to read to you when they are able, to support their learning journeys as often as you can.


You may recently have been made aware of an internet 'challenge' called 'Momo'; it has been around for some time and has come to the attention of children all across the country through social media sites such as Facebook, WhatsApp and, perhaps more worryingly, YouTube and even YouTube Kids. It involves a scary doll-like figure that sends graphic, violent images, asks users to take part in dangerous challenges and has even been associated with self-harm. The 'Momo' figure was actually created as a sculpture featured in an art gallery in Japan, which is completely unrelated to the challenge. We have talked about the appearance of the figure with the children in school, as it has been found to have been 'edited in' to innocent videos on YouTube (such as unboxing of toys and Minecraft videos) by unknown sources. Please be aware of what your children are watching on the internet or via Apps on devices such as tablets and smart phones and please protect them wherever possible by enabling parental controls and reporting inappropriate content should you come across it. Reinforce with your child that this figure is not real and nothing bad will happen if they do come across it. There is some information later in this newsletter containing advice on how to keep your children safe online and there is a Momo Guide for Parents on the National Online Safety website at https://nationalonlinesafety.com/resources/platform-guides/momo-online-safety-guide-forparents/

Finally, towards the end of the month, we will be holding the Spring Parent's Evenings! It is essential that someone attends along with each child so that together we can support their progress through the school and we will be seeking your views in the latest Parent Questionnaire. 
Non Uniform Days

share is barely enough to survive on and maintains poverty for these workers, indeed child labour is often used by farmers to help them earn more.


The second image (with US spelling) shows the principles involved if you purchase a banana with the Fairtrade logo. It is these principles which ensure that plantation workers are paid a living wage and that the distribution of profit from the sale of a banana is much fairer.

Illness & Protecting Vulnerable Pupils

One of our pupils is receiving medical treatment after being very poorly and in hospital. The child is in Nursery but we would like you to notify us if your child has measles, chicken pox or shingles as this could put their treatment at risk. In addition where there is diarrhoea and vomiting in Nursery it is important that a child stays off for 48 hours to prevent infection spreading.

The health and well-being of a pupil depends on your full co-operation with these requests. Thank you in advance.

Safeguarding/Child Protection

Full details on the county's policies, procedures and processes with regard to safeguarding plus analysis of outcomes of serious case reviews can be accessed through the Cumbria LSCB Web Site at www.cumbrialscb.com The site also has a parental information zone.

In addition to the above the school has a 'Safeguarding Zone' on its web site which contains the above link as well as relevant school policies, further information and a diagram showing how we keep your child safe in school. It is well worth a look.

Sharing information is in the best interests of children and their safeguarding. The school reserves the right to share and receive information from other agencies that may had have had dealings with your child.



If you ever have any concerns about the safety or well-being of a child, then you can ring your concerns through to the County's 24 hour 'Safeguarding Hub' number and you can remain anonymous if you wish. Callers can outline their concerns and the Safeguarding Hub will give advice (consultation) if and necessary undertake an assessment of need.



There is now also an adult NSPCC helpline where any concerned adult can seek advice if they are concerned about a child and would like advice on whether to make a referral. The number to call is

Champion' and is a resource available to any adult who would like to confidentially share incidents with her and is a very good source of advice. Just contact the School Office to get in touch with her.

Domestic violence is on the increase and causes terrible harm to victims and the associated children.

It is everyone's responsibility to ensure it is eradicated. We are working closely with the Police and the school will learn of any incidents to support any children whose lives are affected by such an occurrence.

The age ratings are for a purpose, please protect your child's mental health by ensuring they only access age appropriate material. This equally applies to social media sites which all have a lower age limit of 13.

The Rae Way - Back Path

Please be careful using the back path in frosty weather as it was an issue last year and already this year with frost making the tarmacked parts of the path slippy. Unfortunately, the school is unable



to grit this access path as H&S regulations only allow the school to grit pathways into the building within its grounds. The local Council sadly do not have the resources to employ gritters. In cases of bad frost, it is therefore advisable to access the school from the front entrance if you feel the Rae Way is too dangerous.

The school's caretaker will grit the hill and paths as the crow flies to the entrance doors. There is not the time nor the facility to grit everywhere, please do not stray from the gritted areas/gritted lines to the doors as the slip hazard greatly increases and the it

Sugar Smart Book/Game

As many of you will have noted from various news items, childhood obesity has reached really high levels – 22% of children are overweight or obese when they start Primary school and this rises to 34% when they start Secondary school. Sugar is a big part of the problem. Children aged 4 to 10 years old are

eating and drinking more than twice the amount of sugar that they should. The purpose of the 'Sugar Smart' booklet that comes with this newsletter is to enable the children (& the whole family) to learn about healthier swaps they can make to help them lead healthier and happier lives.



If you are a Facebook user and would like to receive news feeds and updates about the school, then don't forget to 'join' the group and select the "see first" button. It is hoped this will dissuade children who are under 13 using Facebook but will allow adults to receive updates about the school.

Indeed, please note no children should have Facebook accounts under the age of 13 and applications to join the group will be refused/accounts will be deleted.

Cyclewise

Children in Year 5 and some from Year 6, who returned booking forms earlier this school year, will



be taking part in Cyclewise next week, the week beginning the 4th March 2019. All children taking part will need warm and waterproof clothing. They will also need a cycle helmet (the instructors will have spares if they forget). In addition, all bikes need to be road worthy and have air in their tyres and brakes that work! Bikes should be locked up against the fence in the Infant yard at the start of each day. If you wish your child to leave their bike on site during the week then they can bring it in at the end of the day and leave it in the corridor.

We have also been informed that funding has been secured for Level 1 Year 4 Cyclewise training. Children in Year 4 received a letter towards the end of last term. Their Cyclewise 'day' will take place on the last day of this term, Friday 29th March.

UK Chief Medical Officers' advice for parents and carers on Children and Young People's screen and social media use

Technology can be a wonderful thing but too much time sitting down or using mobile devices can get in the way of important, healthy activities. Here are some tips for balancing screen use with healthy living.

Sleep matters

Getting enough, good quality sleep is very important. Leave phones outside the bedroom when it is bedtime.



Sharing sensibly

Talk about sharing photos and information online and how photos and words are sometimes manipulated. Parents and carers should never assume that children are happy for their photos to be shared. For everyone – when in doubt, don't upload!



Education matters

Make sure you and your children are aware of, and abide by, their school's policy on screen time.



Keep moving!

Everyone should take a break after a couple of hours sitting or lying down using a screen. It's good to get up and move about a bit. #sitlessmovemore



Safety when out and about

Advise children to put their screens away while crossing the road or doing an activity that needs their full attention.



Talking helps

Talk with children about using screens and what they are watching. A change in behaviour can be a sign they are distressed – make sure they know they can always speak to you or another responsible adult if they feel uncomfortable with screen or social



Family time together

Screen-free meal times are a good idea – you can enjoy face-to-face conversation, with adults giving their full attention to children.



Use helpful phone features

Some devices and platforms have special features try using these features to keep track of how much time you (and with their permission, your children) spend looking at screens or on social media.




. Young Voices Trip

Clocks go forward on the last Sunday of this month (31st March). This will result



The Government have changed some of the eligibility criteria for applying for Free School Meals and Clothing Grants. With the rollout of Universal Credit the level of qualifying income drops from £16, 190 to £7.400 making it much more difficult to claim.

If you claim before you are moved to Universal Credit then the £16, 190 possibly still applies and your entitlement would last until 2022 with **no re-application**. Please see letter from Cumbria below.

Free School Meals - Eligibility Changes

From 1 April 2018, the government are introducing a Universal Credit earning threshold of £7,400 per year for free school meal eligibility

Children who are eligible for free school meals by 1 April 2018 will continue to receive them until at least 2022, without the need for further eligibility checks while Universal Credit is rolled out

All children who currently receive free school meals are not affected and do not need to apply again. They will continue to receive free school meals and clothing vouchers until at least 31 March 2022.

To ensure children continue to receive clothing grants it is crucial that all parents update any change of personal details, i.e. address / name / parent / guardian during this period to March 2022. Failure to do so may result in delays in receiving clothing grants.

APPLY NOW

If you think you are eligible then PLEASE DO APPLY. Even if your child is in Reception or Key Stage 1 and has free meals it is still worth registering as eligibility will continue into Key Stage 2 and you will receive a clothing grant each year. It is a win-win scenario as the school will receive additional funding for every child that is registered.



Keeping Children Safe on the Internet

Further to our communications earlier in the week the character that can pop in to children's browsing on the internet called Momo is causing a lot of worry and concern for many of the children. The character is

scary looking and encourages 'self-harm' and suicidal thoughts. It is of extreme importance that our children are protected from this. Please talk to your child to allay any fears, you may be surprised by their knowledge of it. Children are encouraged to play a game on WhatsApp - no child should be on this platform, it has a

minimum age of **13** for a reason (as does Instagram and other social media platforms). Please <u>delete their accounts</u> if they have one for their own safety and please blame Mr Warbrick if there is a fuss over it.


Some advice on how to set up parental controls from the police is above. In addition there is a whole page poster from 'National safety Online' with information for parents.

We also have learnt that it would also be worth deleting 'cookies' as if this character has been seen previously or you have checked to see what the fuss is about as an adult then cookies will have been placed on your device and these cookies will allow it to pop out again.

Road Closures!!

We have learnt that the road from Lakes College to the Galloping Horse (Scaw Road roundabout) will be closed for re-surfacing for 4 working days from Monday 11th March ('Phase 1' on map below). After that the road from that roundabout to Little Croft will close for a further 6 working days ('Phase 2' on map below).

This will cause major disruption on the route to school for the 2 weeks from that Monday. Please set off to school earlier than normal if driving so your children aren't' late (the traffic going the other way will be much heavier due to increased displaced traffic. Indeed please give serious thought to **walking** to avoid this disruption.



It's important to note that new challenges are arising on the internet all the time. We have created to this guide to raise awareness of the issue and offer advice on helping parents to talk to their children about making safer decisions online. See also our '7 conversation starters' guide for more tips on better communication with your child.

> Momo is a sinister'challenge' that has been around for some time. It has recently resurfaced and once again has come to the attention of schools and children across the country. Dubbed the 'suicide killer game', Momo has been heavily linked with apps such as Facebook, WhatsApp, YouTube, and most recently (and most worryingly)... YouTube Kids. The scary doll-like figure reportedly sends graphic violent images, and asks users to partake in dangerous challenges like waking up at random hours and has even been associated with self-harm. It has been reported that the 'Momo' figure was originally created as a sculpture and featured in an art gallery in Tokyo and unrelated to the 'Momo' challenge we are bearing about in the media Tokyo and unrelated to the 'Momo' challenge we are hearing about in the media.

What parents need to know about

There have been recent reports that some seemingly innocent videos on YouTube and YouTube Kids (such as 'surprise eggs', unboxing videos and Minecraft videos) have been edited by unknown sources to include violence provoking and/or other inappropriate content. Even though YouTube monitor and remove videos that include inappropriate content, clips can be iploaded and viewed thousands of times before they get reported and removed. As a parent, it's difficult to spot these videos as the harmful content doesn't appear until partway through the video.

Popular YouTubers and other accounts have been uploading reaction videos, showing their experience of the MOMO challenge. Some of the videos include a disclosure message warning that the content may be "inappropriate or offensive to some audiences" and that "viewer discretion is advised" but these videos are still easily accessed by clicking 'I understand and wish to proceed. The image of the 'Momo' character can be deeply distressing to children and young people and it's important to note that it may slip through parental settings and filters.

Video apps such as YouTube include an 'up next' feature which automatically starts playing another video based on the video just watched. Due to YouTube's algorithm, users are shown 'suggested videos' that they may be interested in. The thumbnails used on suggested videos are purposefully created in a way to encourage viewers to click them. During our research, we found that when watching one Momo related video, we were shown countless other Momo themed videos and other scary content which would be age-inappropriate for children under 18.



Top Tips for Parents

ELL THEM IT'S NOT REAL

Just like any urban legend or horror story, the concept can be quite frightening and distressing for young people. Whilst this may seem obvious, it's important you to reiterate to your child that Momo is not a person and cannot directly harm them! Also, tell child to not go openly searching for this content online as it may only cause more distress.

It's important for you, as a parent or carer, to be present while your children are online. This will give you a greater understanding of what they are doing on their devices, as well as providing you with the opportunity to discuss, support and stop certain activities that your child may be involved in. As the nature of each task become progressively worse it's also important to recognise any changes in your child's behaviour.

TALK REGULARLY WITH

As well as monitoring your child's activity, it's important for you discuss it with them too. Not only will this give you an understanding of their online actions, but those honest and frequent conversations will encourage your child to feel confident to discuss issues and concerns they may have related to the online world.

DEVICE SETTINGS & PARENTAL CONTROLS

Ensure that you set up parental controls for your devices at home. This will help to restrict the types of content that your child can view, as well as help you to monitor their activity. In addition to this, it's vital that you are aware of your device and account settings to ensure your child's utmost safety. For example, on YouTube you can turn off 'suggested auto-play' on videos to stop your child from viewing content that they have not directly selected.

Trends and viral challenges can be tempting for children to take part in; no matter how dangerous or scary they seem. Make sure you talk to your child about how they shouldn't succomb to peer pressure and do anything they are not comfortable with, online or offline. If they are unsure, encourage them to talk to you or another trusted adult.

REAL OR HOAX?

As a parent it is natural to feel worried about certain things you see online that may be harmful to your child. However, not everthing you see online is true.

Check the validity of the source and be mindful of what you share as it may only cause more worry.

REPORT & BLOCK

You can't always rely on parental controls to block distressing or harmful material. People find ways around a platform's algorithm in order to share and promote this type of material. Due to this, we advise that you flag and report any material you deem to be inappropriate or harmful as soon as you come across it. You should also block the account/content to prevent your child from viewing it. Also encourage your child to record/screenshot any content they feel could be malicious to provide evidence in order to escalate the issue to the appropriate channels.

FURTHER SUPPORT

Speak to the safeguarding lead within your child's school should you have any concerns regarding your child's online activity or malicious content that could affect them.

If your child sees something distressing, it is important that they know where to go to seek help and who their trusted adults are. They could also contact Childline where a trained counsellor will listen to anything that's worrying them.

Ms Cunningham will be replaced by a Miss Rhodes from next week.




